WHAT IS A CHRISTIAN

The word Christian comes from two words, Christ and man. Christ living in a man; man living in Christ; a dynamic relationship. To be a Christian then, is to be in relationship with Jesus Christ. This is a relationship that should influence every aspect of your life.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH

Spiritual growth takes place through the process of discipleship. A disciple is a learner, follower and imitator of Jesus Christ. There are seven basic disciplines of discipleship. Following is a brief comment about each one.

1. FELLOWSHIP

Building relationships with fellow believers.

2. GIVING

Christians give their financial resources to support the ministry of the church. Giving is achieved through tithes, offerings and alms (or sowing seeds).

3. PRAYER

"Prayer is the expression of the human heart in conversation with God. Prayer is a dialogue between two persons who love each other".

Rosalind Rinker Prayer is simply talking and listening to God.

4. SERVICE

Christian service takes place both within the church and in the world. Every believer is called to serve Christ by serving His people.

5. TEACHING

Spiritual instruction comes from both personal Bible study and receiving God's Word through the teaching ministry of the church.

6. WITNESSING

Sharing the love of Christ with another person.

7. WORSHIP

Worship whether private or public, brings a believer into the presence of God.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PRAYER

WHAT IS PRAYER

Prayer is the divine communication between man and God, through His son, Jesus Christ.

- Christian life cannot be sustained without prayer
- Jesus tells us, "that men ought to always pray" (Luke 18:11)
- Prayer is the gateway God has provided for us to communicate with Him.

TITHING AND GIVING

Will a man rob God?
Yet ye have robbed me.
But ye say, Wherein have we robbed thee?
In tithes and offerings Malachi 3:8

WHAT IS A TITHE?

A tithe is $1/10^{th}$ of a person's income, or simply 10 cents out of every dollar you earn.

WHY SHOULD YOU TITHE?

In Malachi 3:10, God's word commands:

Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith, saith the LORD of hosts, if I will not open you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it.

HOW SHOULD YOU TITHE?

God wants us to be cheerful givers. He wants us to give freely without complaining.

In 2nd Corinthians 9:7. God's word commands:

Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver.

WHAT IS GIVING?

Giving is your offering or other financial support of the church and it's ministries that are over and above your tithes.

BAPTISM

(Romans 6:4-6)

Therefore we care buried with him by baptism into death; that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life.

For if we have planted together in the likeness of His death, we shall be also in the likeness of His resurrection.

Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with Him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin.

Baptism Defined

Baptism is an act of faith which symbolizes the Baptist belief, in the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Symbolically, Baptism is the outward show of a Christian's inward belief in the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

It is the death of the believers "old man" or sinful nature.

Immersion in water is symbolic of Christ's buridal in the tomb and depicts the burial of the believers "old man" or sinful nature.

Being raised from the water is symbolic of Christ's resurrection and it depicts our new life in Jesus Christ, where old things have passed away and behold now, all things have become new.

Our sin has been buried and now we walk in the righteousness of Christ.

BAPTISMAL ATTIRE

FEMALES

- Long white gown or robe (preferably high neck)
- White socks
- All undergarments (required)
- Swimming cap or plastic cap to cover hair
- Large white towel
- Removal of all make-up and jewelry

MALES

- White pants
- White tee shirt
- White socks
- Undergarments (required)
- Large White Towel

SPECIAL NOTES:

Remove all make-up and jewelry

- Bring all necessary clothes for after baptism, including undergarments.
- You may desire to wear baptism clothing to church and bring your Sunday Attire to put on after baptism.
- It is not necessary to purchase special attire for baptism. If you do not have white attire, please bring the light colored garments that you have and the church will provide a baptismal robe.

- Please assemble in the Chapel by 9:00 a.m.
- Baptismal Services will begin at 9:45 a.m.

COMMUNION

24 And when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, Take, eat: this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me.

25 After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, this cup is the new testament in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. (1 Corinthians 11:24-25 King James Version (KJV)

COMMUNION DEFINED

A symbolic participation in the last supper that Jesus shared with his disciples, before his crucifixion.

- The bread symbolizes the body of Jesus which was broken for us, through his death on the cross.
- The wine symbolizes the blood of Jesus which was shed, through his death on the cross.

WHO CAN PARTICIPATE

27 So then, whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of sinning against the body and blood of the Lord.

(I Corinthians 11:27)

- Those who have been "saved" through believing that Jesus was raised from the dead and having confessed the Lord Jesus by mouth.
- Those who have been baptized.

HOW SHOULD WE PREPARE FOR COMMUNION

28 Everyone ought to examine themselves before they eat of the bread and drink from the cup. 29 For those who eat and drink without discerning the body of Christ eat and drink judgment on themselves. (I Corinthians 11:28-29)

• Through prayer requesting that our sins be forgiven.

CHURCH ORGANIZATION AND GOVERNMENT

A Baptist church is a self-governing body whose members have equal rights, privileges, and duties. The Baptist Church recognizes only two scriptural officers which date back to the beginning of the New Testament and apostolic time. The two recognized offices are that of the Pastor and Deacon. The scriptural reference for the office of a deacon can be found in *I Timothy 3:8-13*.

The office of the Pastor has a scriptural reference which can be found in *I Timothy 3:1-7*. The pastoral office is that of an oversee. The overseer has the responsibility for oversight of the flock and performs the work of a shepherd in spiritual concerns. The shepherd and flock relationship signifies that the Pastor is responsible for sustaining the church by leading, feeding, guiding, and guarding the flock committed to his care.

The Pastor is also called a Minister. Minister and Pastor are used interchangeably and are often applied to the same person, but these titles are not identical. A Pastor is a Minister, but a Minister is no necessarily a Pastor. A minister is one who preaches the gospel and proclaims glad tidings. A Pastor is one who feeds, leads, and cares for the flock. A Pastor cares for the church, where a Minister is a Preacher and may not have the care of the church.

The Pastor is called by divine appointment from God to pursue the objectives set for the church by Jesus Christ. It is important that the local congregation must be in support of him whom the Lord has sent lead. Full support of the Pastor means whatever is necessary for the comfort and well being of the Pastor and his family, such as salary, housing, and other such benefits that may relieve him of temporal concerns. Support is also necessary for the participation of activities that are intended to enhance his growth and advance the church.

The church has progressed; other offices have been added to meet the needs of the church.

JACKSON MEMORIAL BAPTIST CHURCH HISTORY

'In the beginning was the word and the word was with God and the word was God''

(John 1:1)

Such is the history of Jackson Memorial Baptist Church. From the beginning, God has orchestrated the movement of our church. In 83 years, God has shown us the beauty of His love and we have felt His presence in us and through us. Though we know that we have only just begun, and that there is still a lot to be done, we are proud of our history and of where we have come.

What we know as Jackson Memorial Baptist Church began in 1934 as Shady Grove Baptist Church in Atlanta, Georgia. Shady Grove was founded in May 1934 with Reverend Huell Jerome Jackson, of Detroit, Michigan, as Pastor.

The first church conference was held on June 2, 1934. By August 1934, the congregation stood 60 members strong. In June 1935, the following organizations had been formed: Nurses Guild, I Will Society, Blue Circle Club, Deacons Club and Finance Board.

The First Anniversary of Shady Grove Baptist church was on January 21 through February 1, 1936. Shady Grove changed its name to McDaniel Street Baptist Church on April 8, 1936 during the church conference. Upon recommendation by Pastor Jackson, McDaniel Street Baptist Church became Greater Elm Street Baptist Church on December 27, 1937 during the church conference.

Between 1938 and 1960, Greater Elm Street Baptist Church served as a devoted and respected place of worship in the Atlanta community, promoting the general welfare of the citizens of Atlanta. In 1960, the City of Atlanta's Urban Renewal Program, in addition to the inadequacy of the Elm Street facility, forced Pastor Jackson and the congregation to seek another site. Blacks were moving into the previously all white Adamsville community. Pastor Jackson, the Deacons and Trustees negotiated the perfect site in Adamsville on the comer of Fairburn Road and Thompson Drive to build a new edifice. Pastor Jackson and the Elm Street congregation brought the same spirit, faith and togetherness to the new site that was exemplified from the very beginning at Shady Grove.

On the evening of Thursday, September 26, 1963 Dr. Huell Jackson answered the call from heaven after 29 untiring and faithful years of servitude to the Lord and to the Elm Street members who loved him dearly. Oftentimes, a membership without a Pastor is like a flock without a shepherd, but not this Elm Street membership.

They searched and searched until they found Rev. James L. Green who remained Pastor from January 30, 1964 until 1970. On January 8, 1966 Greater Elm Street Baptist Church was renamed Jackson Memorial Baptist Church in memory of Dr. Huell Jerome Jackson.

In December 1970, the Lord called Gregory Anthony Sutton; age eighteen, to the pastorate of Jackson Memorial Baptist Church. On the first Sunday in January 1971, Rev. Sutton began pastoral duties with approximately 85 members and \$300 in the church treasury. Knowledge of this young anointed minister soon became widespread and the church membership grew tremendously. When Jackson Memorial could not adequately hold its members, the idea was born to build a larger church. After raising \$100,000 to demonstrate its borrowing worth, Jackson Memorial was ready to begin construction of a new building.

On the second Sunday in May 1977, we marched out of the old church building to make way for a new one. After several bids, R. A. Banks construction Company was chosen to build the new church. Worship services were being held in the Harper High School Auditorium. By the Grace of God, souls were still being saved, and soon the auditorium could not seat the growing membership. On the fifth Sunday in May 1977, worship service was moved to the Seventh-Day Adventist Church at the corner of Hightower and Collier Drive. One year and three months later on the second Sunday in August 1978, Rev. Sutton led members, officers and friends in a motorcade from the Seventh-Day Adventist Church to the New Jackson Memorial Baptist Church, marching to our adopted theme "We've Come This Far by Faith".

Rev. Sutton encouraged all members to strive to pay off the existing church mortgage and this goal was accomplished with a Mortgage burning Ceremony held on February 9, 1986 (seven years before the due date of the loan). In December 1986, Rev. Sutton shared his vision for a new edifice that would be a beacon of light for the Atlanta community. By February 1987, a pledge

committee was in place and members raised \$250,000.00 to demonstrate our purchasing power. On April 6, 1987, the congregation voted to purchase property at the corner of Collier Drive and Fairburn Road. On Sunday, May 31, 1987, the church began holding 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. services as a remedy for the overflowing crowds. On June 16, 1987, the purchase was made and in August 1988, the property mortgage was burned.

By February 20, 1989, Rev. Sutton, along with members of the Deacon Board and the Trustee Board traveled to Tyler, Texas to survey a church model under consideration. On March 12, 1989, the staff of Paul and Associates, a management firm from Tyler, presented a slide presentation to Rev. Sutton and the membership. It was voted that Paul and Associates would construct the new edifice and the congregation stepped out on faith once again. The ground breaking ceremony took place on June 10, 1990 at the corner of Collier Drive and Fairburn Road.

The edifice at 269 Fairburn Road was sold to Fuller Memorial Tabernacle Fire Baptized Holiness Church of God on September 28, 1990 under an agreement that both churches would jointly occupy the building during the erection of the new Jackson Memorial. The construction team began work on the new site on Monday, November 6, 1990.

On February 2, 1992, we embarked upon a new destiny led by an anointed Rev. Gregory A. Sutton, and marched into the new facility located at 534 Fairburn Road knowing we had come this far by faith. Jackson Memorial's heritage is a fruitful one. For the past decade, many of our pioneers' dreams have been realized.
